APHL 2025 provides a great opportunity for scientists from environmental laboratories and human and animal food laboratories to:

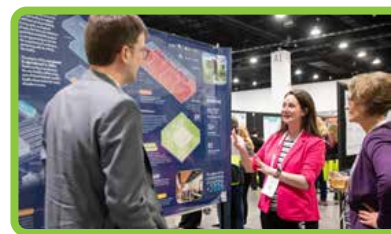
- Learn more about laboratory issues and emerging technologies related to food safety, regulatory science, radiochemistry, environmental health, food chemistry, emergency preparedness and more.
